A potter's bench full of rustic jugs in various sizes & hand-thrown in a selection of different clays. Can you tune the vessels by filling them with water and gently tapping with the beaters provided?

(10 GREEN BOTTLES)

Gently caress the bronze leaves and stalks of the oversized ceramic fruit to produce notes created from tinkling cider bottles.

Play the medieval 'cooking pot' inspired xylophone by striking up a tune on the ceramic bones.

The artworks are a permanent resource and are accessible when the museums are open.

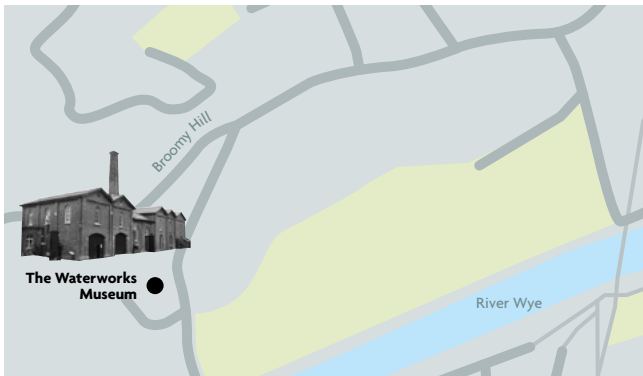

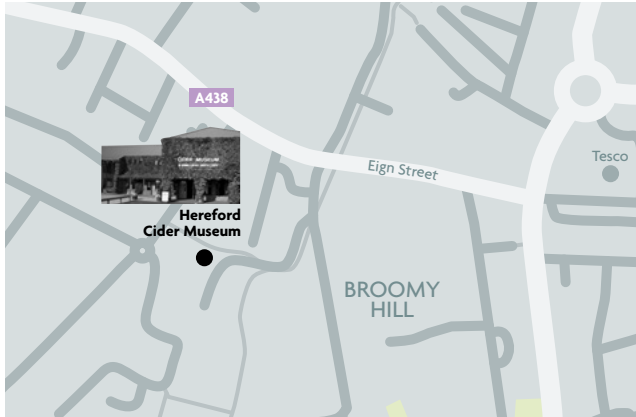

The Old House is a remarkably well preserved example of a 17th Century timber-framed building and is situated in the heart of Hereford, surrounded by the commercial centre of the city. It is a startling sight, standing as the sole reminder of times-gone-by in the middle of a modern shopping precinct.
